## ALTERNATE POSITIONS ON THE TROMBONE

- Alternate positions are a direct result of certain notes being available in different overtone series. Because of this, these notes are possible in more than one slide position; for example, middle F can be played in both 1st and 6th positions.
- However, due to intonation problems in the overtone series (certain partials are out of tune), most alternates are not in the normal place on the slide. For example, middle D, normally in 1st position, is found in a flat (or lowered) 4th position. This is because the 6th partial is sharp; middle D is the 6th partial in 4th position. Music marks these intonation tendencies either with a or ♭ marking, or a + or ♯ marking.
- Alternate positions are used for two reasons:
  - 1. To make passages easier to play (see below):



2. To eliminate awkward slide motions (see below):



The most common alternate positions are given below:
